2024–2025 THEME VERSES

Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God—this is your true and proper worship. Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will.

PROGRAM NOTE

The theme of this concert, "Renewing Minds, Transforming Hearts," is drawn from Scripture's calls to challenge untruths in culture, nurture resilience, and promote unity. As we explore the concert's

three subthemes, each musical selection offers a reflection on these ideas, aiming to touch both mind and spirit.

Wisdom Beyond Emotion: Anchoring the Heart

This opening section emphasizes the importance of balancing emotion with wisdom and understanding. Proverbs 3:5–8 reminds us, "Trust in the LORD with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding"—a reminder that faith and wisdom require more than just following our feelings. The jubilant strains of Ronald Staheli's **Sing a New Song** invite us to embrace a broader perspective, looking beyond the immediate and embracing God's vision for life. Dan Forrest's **Who can sail without the wind?** follows, offering a

metaphor of the need for guidance and steadfastness amidst the winds of life. Finally, Arvo Pärt's **Solfeggio** provides a minimalist meditation, its clarity and order encouraging reflection and standing in contrast to emotional turmoil.

From Trials to Triumph: Strength in Vulnerability

In the second section, we move from the introspective to the transformative power of trials. As James 1:2–4 tells us, "Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds, for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness." This see opens with the world premiere of Nicholas Nicassio's I Will Rejoice, a setting of Habakkuk 3:17–19, capturing the prophet's declaration of faith and joy amid desolation. Palestrina's Sicut cervus follows, offering its serene yet longing lines, echoing a psalmist's yearning for God amid hardship. This longing deepens in Z. Randall Stroope's Lamentations of Jeremiah, which gives voice to profound sorrow and the cry for deliverance. Brahms' Wie lieblich sind deine Wohnungen from Ein deutsches Requiem shifts to a message of comfort, portraying a vision of divine peace for those who endure. Elaine Hagenberg's You Do Not Walk Alone closes this section, reassuring listeners of the support that surrounds them in times of struggle, echoing 2 Corinthians 12:9–10, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness."

Unity in Diversity: Healing the Divide

The concert concludes with a call to unity and communal hope, challenging the divisive tendencies of our time. Ephesians 4:1–3 calls us to "walk in a manner worthy of the calling... with all humility and gentleness... eager to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace." Moses Hogan's **Wade in the Water** evokes the struggles for justice and the journey toward liberation, connecting deeply with those seeking redemption. **Tshotsholoza**, arranged by Jeffery Ames, celebrates perseverance and collective strength, a vibrant reminder that "you are all one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:28). Finally, Mack Wilberg's **Saints Bound for Heaven** sends the audience out with joy, a triumphant affirmation of our shared hope and future.

Together, these works encourage us to reflect deeply, endure trials with strength, and strive for unity. This journey from introspection to celebration reflects the call of our theme verses for the year, Romans 12:1–2: "Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—His good, pleasing and perfect will." Our prayer as we perform tonight is that our music opens us to transformation, equipping us to meet life's challenges with wisdom and hope. Soli Deo Glorial

THE ROBERTS CHORALE

The Roberts Chorale is the premier vocal ensemble of Roberts Wesleyan University in Rochester, New York, devoted to the study and performance of high-quality choral music from diverse styles, musical eras, languages, and cultures. Bonded by a passion for compelling musical performance and a desire for meaningful Christian fellowship, the Chorale is an ensemble of talented singerartists who combine their gifts to cultivate excellence in choral singing, affirming the ensemble's mission statement to "express ourselves humbly and honestly through song" and "find joy in all we do."

The Chorale took its first international tour and released its first recordings on LP under director Gregory Goida. During the 33-year tenure of his successor, Robert Shewan, the Chorale released multiple recordings on the Albany label and performed frequently with the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra. The proud heritage of choral singing at Roberts Wesleyan College was further fostered by subsequent Chorale directors Nelson Hill, Stephen Caracciolo, Jeffery McGhee, Jamie Spillane, and David Chin. Under its current director, Adam Potter, the Chorale continues to serve the university and community through frequent on- and off-campus performances, recording projects, collaborations with the Roberts Symphony Orchestra, joint concerts with other ensembles in the region, biennial domestic performance tours, quadrennial international performance tours, and innovative programming and partnerships.

The Chorale's recent repertoire has included Choral Fantasy (Beethoven), Polovetsian Dance & Chorus (Borodin), Et in Terra Pax (Finzi), Requiem for the Living (Forrest), Messiah and "Zadok the Priest" (Handel), Mass in C (Mozart), A Vision Unfolding (Pederson), Fantasia on Christmas Carols (Vaughan Williams), and the New York State premiere of LUX: The Dawn from On High (Forrest). In addition to major works and classical music, the Chorale delights in inviting its audiences into a spirit of worship through the singing of new music, well-crafted hymn settings, music from the Global South, gospel music, and spirituals.

OUR CONDUCTOR

Adam Potter is Director of Choral Activities and Associate Professor of Music at Roberts Wesleyan University in Rochester, New York. At RWU, he conducts The Roberts Chorale, Coro di Voci Treble Choir, and Redhawk Voices Tenor–Bass Chorus, administers the university choral program, mentors choral music education majors, and teaches coursework in conducting, vocal music methods, and music education. He earned a Ph.D. in choral conducting and music education from the Florida State University College of Music. His choral music mentors include Judy Bowers, Kevin Fenton, Brandon Johnson, and André Thomas.

Prior to his appointment at Roberts, Dr. Potter enjoyed positions as Director of Choral Activities at Delta State University in Cleveland, Mississippi and Director of Vocal Music at Dansville High School (N.Y.), overseeing thriving and growing vocal music curricula. He is also an active church musician, currently at Rochester Christian Reformed Church and having previously served Presbyterian congregations in Florida and Mississippi. During the summers, he conducts choirs and teaches voice and music theory at the Csehy Summer School of Music in Langhorne, Pennsylvania.



Dr. Potter is a sought-after guest conductor and clinician for honor choirs, choral-orchestral performances, and high schools and colleges, as well as an active adjudicator of choral performance festivals. He has guest-conducted and presented at professional conferences in a dozen states. He has also been a guest lecturer at the Kenya Conservatoire of Music and a guest artist with the Nairobi Chamber Chorus in conjunction with the AVoice4Peace worldwide peace awareness project. His research interests include sight-singing pedagogy and music literacy, voice building in the choral rehearsal, and applications of the servant-leadership model to conducting music ensembles.

As an active member of the American Choral Directors Association, Dr. Potter has served as a repertoire and resources chair at the state level in Mississippi and New York and served on the planning committee of the 2020 Eastern Region conference in Rochester. He maintains memberships in the National Association for Music Education and the New York State School Music Association. He is also a member of the Golden Key International Honour Society and Pi Kappa Lambda, the American honor society for musicians.

In addition to his professional activities, Dr. Potter hosts the podcast "We Should've Recorded That!" with his former student Phillip Woodard. Proud to be the son of dairy farmers from rural Pennsylvania, he was the first person in his family to attend college and remains grateful that God has blessed him with opportunities to learn the value of both hard work and educational advancement.
