#### **From the Pastor**

In these articles, we have been looking at the Lord's Prayer. For this article, I want to look what it means to pray, "Give us this day our daily bread."

So, what is your favorite meal? What is your favorite place to eat out? What is your favorite dessert? For me, the answer to these questions are my favorite meal is sushi; my favorite places to eat out are Japanese restaurants (which we never go to because they usually don't have a lot for kids). My favorite dessert? That is difficult to answer as there is too much to choose from, but right now, I would have to say yellow cake with chocolate icing.

So, here is what we need to think about, especially in this part of the Lord's Prayer. Just the fact that we can even think about such things shows how far we are removed economically from Jesus's day. In His day, "Meat was rare and in 1st-century Palestine would only have been eaten by the wealthy and most likely would have been goat; beef and lamb would have been reserved for holidays.... The governing authorities arranged for wheat and barley to be stored in silos and rationed, but eventually became susceptible to mold. And there was always the risk of shortages as a result of a bad growing season, drought, disaster. disease. natural war" (https://thefivebeasts.wordpress.com/2022/10/10/foo d-insecurity-at-the-time-of-christ).

We also don't understand the phrase "Give this us this day our daily bread" rich meaning compared to most people in the world. According to WorldVision: "The World Bank reports that 712 million people, nearly 1 in 11 people globally, live on less than \$2.15 a day....Sub-Saharan Africa has the highest rate of children living in extreme poverty, reaching 40% in 2022. Nearly 90% of children living in extreme poverty reside in either sub-Saharan Africa or South Asia.... 1.1 billion people, including 566 million children, live in multidimensional poverty, accounting for just over 18% of the world's

population" (<a href="https://www.worldvision.org/sponsorship-news-stories/global-poverty-facts">https://www.worldvision.org/sponsorship-news-stories/global-poverty-facts</a>).

So, what are we to do with this part of the Lord's Prayer? Are we to simply ignore it? Well, of course not!! It is Scripture after all.

So, how are we to apply this? For starters, we need to realize that many in the world face food insecurity where we don't, and so not only should we pray for them, but pray about how we might be able to help them.

However, the other aspect of this is that this part of the prayer shows us a daily reliance upon God. Jesus emphasized a "daily" reliance upon God, much like the Israelites did in gathering only what was needed for that particular day as they were out in the wilderness, so if we are praying this prayer and truly mean it, it shows a daily reliance upon God in all that we do.

This is where some who face daily hunger probably have an advantage over us who are not as concerned about food security. Don't get me wrong. I am thankful that I am not in the spot of facing hunger like most of the world faces, especially for my wife and children, and yet, I can testify that my greatest spiritual growth has come from difficulties in life. For those Christians who face the daily struggle of hunger, they fully understand a daily reliance upon God for the most basic of human necessities.

So, this is where I long to be spiritually in all that I am and hope to be, to wake up each morning, and sincerely say to God, "Lord, I am putting my life and especially the life of my family in your hands. Thank you for how You have provided for me already. Give me and my family the bread and other nourishment that we need today, and help us to rely on you in a deeper way."

Sarah Speer, the missionary we support at the Kimia Leprosy Center in the Congo, has returned to her post after spending time in Canada caring for her sister with cancer and also visiting supporters like us. Please continue to pray for Sarah and her sister, who is still undergoing cancer treatment. Sarah has purchased an airline ticket that will allow her to return home if her sister's situation changes.

Here are some excerpts from Sarah's most recent newsletter and correspondence she sent directly to our church family:

"Please pass on my Greetings to all the wonderful, compassionate people at Bergen. If all goes well, I will show your pictures and that of my time at Bergen to our Congolese family.

"Jesus loves small numbers to accomplish His purposes and to show forth His honor and glory. Amongst the 18 on treatment at the Kimia Center, there are 15 who are preparing to be baptized on December 24. What does that mean? They are beginning to learn about God and the wonderful gift of Jesus, who brings life and healing to their hearts, minds, and bodies. Join us in prayer that they will become "Salt and Light" in their communities—demonstrating in word and in deed that they have been healed in body and in spirit; the chains of Satan have been broken, and they are free. Thanks so much for being a vital part of this life-giving ministry.

"Recently, I was informed that with the extra Outreach Missions (12) to screen and distribute the leprosy medicines, the funds in the Kimia Center account have been depleted. Now the whole ministry has to be reinforced. So, I am appealing for an extraspecial response from you, our loyal supporters. The amount required over and above the current provisions would be \$7,000 for the next several months, to bring everything back in line.

"Support for me and all aspects of the ministry in Congo is being reevaluated. This will be communicated shortly. Let's keep working together by prayer and giving, to see lives saved for His honor and glory. Praise God that "a little in the hand of God is much," just like one kernel of corn then produces lots of corn cobs loaded with new kernels! Our God is great! Rejoice and be glad!

"I will take my pictures from Bergen to Congo and show them to Serge. Maybe we will be able to do a ZOOM before Easter. The very best to everyone for the Christmas Season! We have the most joyous time because we know Jesus. Greetings to the Bergen Family.


# **Church Finances** November 2024
